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INTRODUCTION

Every year, thousands of BIPOC writers around the world enter screenwriting competitions with dreams of being discovered and elevating their careers. For many hopefuls, winning or placing as a finalist is almost a sure path to finding representation and being hired to work on Open Writing Assignments (OWAs) or being staffed on a network or streamer. Additionally, many competitions offer prize money and other valuable perks.

Based on publicly provided data, it is estimated that each individual competition receives, on average, between 1,000 and 2,000 submissions, generating millions of dollars in collective revenue for the entire screenwriting competition industry.

Yet, for many BIPOC writers, the investment in some of the top contests has not paid off. While there were many diverse writers who placed high in various screenwriting competitions in 2021 and 2022, the top spots were still elusive for many.

This report contains analysis of 824 writers that were named as winners or finalists in 21 popular screenwriting and awards competitions in the U.S. The following data captured in this report was derived from screenwriting platforms such as Coverfly, Moviebytes and individual competition websites. Statistics from screenwriting labs, programs, fellowships or competitions with a focus on diverse writers were not included.



RESEARCH DATA

It is to be noted that the majority of screenwriting competitions mentioned in this report accept "blind submissions" or screenplays that contain no author information such as a name, email, etc. as a way to minimize potential bias of readers and judges.

For this study, screenwriters were identified by sourcing publicly available information found on social media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube, LinkedIn, IMDB, personal websites as well as on Coverfly. Writers whose identity could not be verified were not included in this report.

Additionally, when a script was created by a writing team, those writers were counted as individual placements.





The racial and ethnic background of male and female writers who placed as finalists and winners in screenwriting competitions demonstrates that Black writers share the majority of representation (33 percent), followed closely by Asians (28.1 percent), Latinx and multiracial writers (tied at 17.7 percent) and Middle Eastern and North African (MENA) writers. Only two Native American writers were identified for this report.







The percentage of male writers who placed in the finalist or winning rounds skewed heavily towards white men at 73.1 percent with BIPOC males representing 27 percent of the total. Only 4 percent of MENA male writers and and 1 Native American male writer were identified for this report.








BIPOC Screenwriters

The percentage of female writers who placed in the finalist or winning rounds skewed heavily towards white women at 79.4 percent (or 246) with BIPOC females representing 18 percent of the total (or 66). Only 1 Native American female writer was identified for this report.

CONCLUSIONS

According to the 2021 <u>UCLA Hollywood</u>
<u>Diversity Report</u>, on-screen diversity in television and film is increasing. So, too, is the diversity of the U.S. population. Within the next two decades, the U.S. Census estimates that people from multicultural backgrounds of all ages will constitute the majority.

Therefore, it is imperative that screenwriting competitions prepare for that reality by increasing their marketing efforts to attract more diverse writers as their perspectives and stories will be even more relevant to multicultural audiences, especially on streaming platforms.

Additionally, it is to be noted that not all screenwriting competitions are for all writers. For instance, niche competitions in the genres of Comedy, Sci-fi or Animation, may not be an inappropriate fit for a dramatic writer. However, as more producers, agents and managers turn to screenwriting competitions as a resource when looking for new, diverse talent, it is essential that efforts are made to attract the type voices that audiences are searching for. Simply put, it is a smart business strategy that is sure to benefit everyone.
